Action on Junior College

The Rome-Floyd County Chamber of Commerce has taken the initiative in seeking the location of a junior college here. Directors of the Chamber in a unanimous resolution urged the Floyd County Board of Roads and Revenue, City Commission and the existing junior college study committee to join "in every possible" effort to secure an accredited institution.

Funds have not been appropriated to implement a Board of Regents plan for state assistance to support a number of new junior colleges in communities all over the state. But, they undoubtedly will be available in the next year or so, and community study should be started now on proposed alternate organizational methods, possible sites, local financing, and many other factors involved.

The Rome-Floyd County Community

has many conditions which recommend it for a junior college location—its central location in Northwest Georgia, population, financial stability, ease of access and the other resources which already have established a reputation as an education center. Addition of an accredited state institution would be an important new resource, culturally and economically. It would virtually assure a higher level of education for our young people, many of whom now are denied that opportunity.

The action of the Chamber of Commerce in recommending the local effort is an area in which it can effectively serve as the focal point for community interest and activity. We believe the effort is in the community service and will be favorably considered. Rome News-Tribune

'... To Meet Challenge of the Future'

"Studies give definite proof that by the end of this decade young people seeking admission to college in Georgia will exceed the present capacity of state institutions, plus the planned capacity of private institutions, by many thousands. This means that many of these young people will have no college opportunity unless we plan and act now."

So wrote the Joint Committee on Education reporting to the General Assembly last January. The total repart was lengthy and detailed but the brief summary quoted above backgrounds the picture in Georgia.

In 1962 a national survey included Georgia in the region labeled "Second Most Difficult to Get in College." Overcrowding by enroliment and higher tuition fees necessitated by greater operating costs have combined to produce the situation which limits posthigh school opportunity for many of our promising young people. This, at a time when we are increasingly aware that high school graduation is not adequate education and that the future welfare and development of the state depends on an educated, informed citizenry.

Among the major recommendations of the Joint Committee was establishment of a statewide system of junior colleges providing at least two years of education beyond high school. Proposal for two of these colleges to be located in the Northwest Georgia area has generated enthusiastic initial response.

The prospective location of one of these institutions in Floyd County is favored by a number of factors: Central location in a heavily populated area served by adequate highways; the indication of several hundred potential students that they would be interested in attending a college here; the generous support of two of our neighboring counties; the ability to provide an adequate site and services, and, probably most important, the positive action of the Floyd Board of Roads and Revenue in stating a bond election would be called to provide the necessary local financing.

Final determination of the college location, of course, rests with the state's Board of Regents but preliminary action has placed Floyd in a favorable position. Ultimately, the decision whether it is to be a part of our community rests with the Floyd votertaxpayer.

When that time comes it will be well to remember the words of Floyd Sen. J. Battle Hall, one of the principal authors of the legislature's Joint Study Committee report. Speaking of our coming graduates the other day, he said: "As responsible citizens we can do no less than provide the facilities to meet the challenges of the future."

Statement by John R. Bertrand at Meeting of Floyd County Junior College Committee, Rome, Georgia 2 p.m., January 27, 1963

Certainly the citizens of northwest Georgia deserve the best possible services of higher education. We do have two private colleges in Rome, but unless these colleges can also serve the citizens in much the same way that public junior colleges can, we should have such a junior college located in this area. I personally feel that an excellent plan could be developed in the two private colleges for serving junior college students in this area, which would be less costly than constructing buildings on new campuses in Rome, or Summerville, or Rockmart or any other city in northwest Georgia.

For several years I was a dean at the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas. While there, one of my responsibilities was consultant to the Texas junior colleges. Fifteen to twenty years ago, Texas and California were pioneering in the junior college movement. Ten to fifteen years ago when I was serving as consultant to the Texas junior colleges, two private institutions, the University of Houston and Hardin College (now Midwestern University) had public junior college units as a part of their total programs. They used their physical facilities which were built with private and municipal funds to service the state. These two institutions received state appropriations for each student registered at the freshman-sophomore level as did the public junior colleges. Ι realize that Georgia's junior college program was organized on a different basis than the one which existed in Texas, but I feel that a plan similiar to the one followed in Texas might be worthy of consideration for this area, provided governing boards of either or both of the private colleges would concur.

I would strongly urge that a very thorough state-wide study be made of the educational needs and how these can best be met before we begin establishing additional colleges in any part of the state.

Based on my experience as a junior college consultant for some five years in Texas, and experience in Libya just before coming to Georgia, I predict that civic pride will result in each "Possum Trot" over the state of Georgia seeking to have a college located in its "city." Some of these "Possum Trots" may be able to raise necessary funds, but may not be located in a significant area of educational need.

I do want to repeat my personal position which has been recorded several times and under several circumstances during the past three years. These views may not represent the views of Berry's Board of Trustees and, therefore, should not be interpreted as being the official views of the institution which I serve. In summary, it is my belief that, unless the two private colleges in Rome-Floyd County can meet the college needs of citizens of northwest Georgia, a state junior college should be located in this area. Furthermore, it is my belief that if an objective study reveals a need for a public junior college in northwest Georgia, it probably will also reveal that Rome-Floyd County will be the most appropriate location for it. Personally I shall support the findings of an impartial study about how best to meet the educational needs of the citizens of this area.

On April 4, 1963, prior to my knowledge that the Rome-Floyd County Chamber of Commerce expected to submit an application to the Board of Regents for the location of a public junior college in Floyd County, I mailed the letter (copy attached), just read by Judge Maddox to Mayor Charles Cowan of the City of Cartersville. In this letter, which had been requested by Mayor Cowan, I sought to establish that:

- 1. It was difficult to determine the precise effect of a junior college in this area on existing colleges.
- The need for and location of additional colleges in northwest Georgia should be established by an objective study by an impartial outside group.
- 3. I would support any decision by the Board of Regents on need and location based on a comprehensive and impartial study.

These points are equally pertinent to the application being submitted by Floyd County, it seems to me, even though it is my impression that a thorough study would prove that Rome-Floyd County should be the location for one of the two public junior colleges which apparently are to be developed in northwest Georgia.

Certainly I believe in education and in its importance to our future. So believing, I cannot and will not knowingly do any thing that would adversely affect educational opportunity for the young people of this or any other area.

I do have several concerns which I feel an obligation to express:

- 1. I am fearful that the apparent decision to locate two public junior colleges in northwest Georgia is not based upon an objective study of need.
- 2. Few of us may realize the tremendous financial load ahead of us if we are adequately to meet the primary and secondary school educational needs in this area. Substantial additional funds are a dire necessity if we are to provide adequate school rooms, facilities and qualified teachers for our present 12-grade public educational system. To adequately meet this need is absolutely the first necessity.
- 3. It would be far more costly to build new plants and employ qualified college faculty members than it would be to develop a grant-in-aid plan which would make possible the full utilization of presently existing colleges in this area.
- 4. Realizing the increasing need for educational opportunity, Berry College has for the past four years been gradually and, we hope, soundly modifying its facilities in order to meet the needs for a student body of 1,500 boarding students and as many day students as meet admission requirements.

Summarily, if it has been or is determined that there are to be two public junior colleges in northwest Georgia, it is my belief that the most appropriate location for one of them is in or near Rome, and I would recommend that location. However, whatever the decision concerning need and location, I expect to give full support to any such institution(s) that may be established.

Dear Mayor Cowan:

Thank you for telephoning to inquire about my opinion of the effect a junior college located in Cartersville, Georgia, might have upon Berry College.

It is impossible, of course, to determine the precise effect. Perhaps some persons who otherwise would attend Berry College would enroll in a junior college located in this section of the state. Probably some persons who otherwise would not enter any college would enroll in a junior college located within commuting distance from their homes and later transfer to Berry College to earn their bachelor's degrees. Possibly these two groups would balance each other.

A more basic point for consideration, in my judgment, is whether or not there is a need for providing additional opportunity to attend college to young people in northwest Georgia.

If private and public colleges in this area are not providing this opportunity, I believe that a junior college should be constructed within the area. However, it is my opinion that such a junior college should be located only after an objective study by an impartial outside group. The study should include investigation of the over-all higher education needs of the people of this area, an analysis of how these needs can best be met, and identification of the resources available to meet the needs.

Personally it is my great hope that no decision will be reached until a comprehensive and impartial study has been made by a group designated by the Board of Regents, assuming the board will be the body making the final decision.

You can depend on me, Mayor Cowan, to give complete support to any decision soundly based on a full and impartial study of the educational needs of this area of our state.

I genuinely appreciate your interest in education.

A RESOLUTION TO REGULATE AND PROVIDE FOR THE ISSUANCE OF \$3,215,000 FLOYD COUNTY JUNIOR COLLEGE BONDS IN ORDER TO MAKE AVAIL-ABLE TRAINING AND INSTRUCTION BEYOND THE TWELFTH GRADE; TO PROVIDE FOR THE DATE AND RATES OF INTEREST SAID BONDS ARE TO BEAR AND FOR THE MATURITIES OF SAID BONDS; TO PROVIDE FOR THE SUBMISSION TO THE QUALIFIED VOTERS OF FLOYD COUNTY THE QUESTION OF WHETHER OR NOT SAID BONDS SHALL BE AUTHORIZED AT AN ELECTION AND TO CALL SAID ELECTION; TO PROVIDE FOR THE LEVY AND COLLECTION OF TAXES TO SERVICE SAID BONDED INDEBTEDNESS, IF AUTHORIZED, AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES:

WHEREAS, pursuant to an amendment to Article VII, Section VII, Paragraph I of the Constitution of the State of Georgia (Georgia Laws 1964, Vol. I, p. 1063 et seq.) which amendment was ratified at the General Election held November 3, 1964 and proclaimed by the Governor of the State of Georgia on the 20th day of November, 1964, the governing authority of Floyd County is authorized and empowered to: "...(1) acquire real property and to acquire, construct and equip buildings and facilities for education beyond the twelfth grade and to convey any such property so acquired to the Board of Regents of the University System of Georgia, its successors or assigns; (2) contribute funds to the Board of Regents of the University System of Georgia to be applied toward the acquisition of real property and the acquisition, construction and equipping of buildings and facilities for education beyond the twelfth grade.

"In order to finance such undertaking, the governing authority of Floyd County is hereby authorized to issue general obligation bonds from time to time bearing the rate or rates of interest and maturing at the years and amounts determined by said governing authority. Any bonds issued in pursuance of the authority herein granted shall be issued in accordance with the provisions of this Constitution and the laws governing the issuance of general obligation bonds. The taxes assessed, levied and collected for the payment of the bonded indebtedness herein provided for shall be upon all the taxable property in Floyd County, including any such property in any municipal or independent school system or district. Prior to exercising the authority herein granted, the governing authority of Floyd County shall have contracted with the Board of Regents of the University System of Georgia to convey any property or funds so acquired to the Board of Regents of the University System of Georgia; and the Board of Regents shall have contracted with the governing authority of Floyd County to accept any such property or funds for the purpose of constructing and equipping such buildings and facilities and to operate and maintain the same as a unit of the University System of Georgia rather than as a part of the public school system of this State."; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners of Roads and Revenues of Floyd County, Georgia, charged with the duties of contracting debts and managing the affairs of Floyd County has made a thorough study and investigation of the need for providing higher and specialized training and instruction beyond the twelfth grade for the youth of Floyd County and others desiring such training and instruction and such investigation discloses the urgent necessity for making available such training and instruction beyond the twelth grade to the youth of Floyd County and others desiring such training and instruction, all for the development of the mind and cultural pursuits of the youth of Floyd County and others desiring to avail themselves of such educational opportunities; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners of Roads and Revenues deems it to the best interest of education in the County to contribute and make available on its part a sum of not less than \$3,215,000 in order that such training and instruction beyond the twelfth grade can be made available to the youth of Floyd County and others desiring such training and instruction; and WHEREAS, it appears to said Board of Commissioners that the most feasible plan to accomplish this desired result is by the issuance and sale of \$3,215,000 principal amount of Floyd County Junior College Bonds for the purpose of contributing funds to be applied toward the cost of acquiring, constructing and equipping school buildings, facilities, utilities and site improvements, including roads, walkways, parking areas, landscaping and drainage facilities, necessary, useful or desirable in connection therewith, acquiring the necessary property therefor, both real and personal, and paying expenses incident to accomplishing the foregoing, in order to provide training and instruction beyond the twelfth grade for the youth of Floyd County and others desiring such training and instruction; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners of Roads and Revenues has been given firm assurance that the Board of Regents of the University System of Georgia, acting for and on behalf of the Regents of the University System of Georgia, will, after said bonds have been favorably voted by the voters of Floyd County, enter into a contract concerning the use of the proceeds to be derived from the sale of said bonds and the conveyance of such real property so acquired together with improvements thereon in accordance with the provisions of said Constitutional Amendment; and

WHEREAS, under the Constitution and laws of the State of Georgia it is necessary to submit to the qualified voters of Floyd County the question of whether or not \$3,215,000 principal amount of Junior College Bonds should be issued for the aforesaid purpose, which said bonds, if authorized, shall be dated, shall bear interest from date at the rates per annum and shall mature as hereinafter more fully set forth.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Commissioners of Roads and Revenues of Floyd County, and it is hereby resolved by authority of same that an election be and is hereby called to be

held in all the election districts of Floyd County, on the 5th day of November, 1968, at which election there shall be submitted to the qualified voters of said County the question of whether or not Junior College Bonds in the aggregate principal amount of \$3,215,000 shall be issued for the purpose of contributing funds to be applied toward the cost of acquiring, constructing and equipping school buildings, facilities, utilities and site improvements, including roads, walkways, parking areas, landscaping and drainage facilities, necessary, useful or desirable in connection therewith, acquiring the necessary property therefor, both real and personal, and paying expenses incident to accomplishing the foregoing, in order to provide training and instruction beyond the twelfth grade for the youth of Floyd County and others desiring such training and instruction; said bonds, if authorized, to be dated November 1, 1968, in the denomination of \$5,000 each, numbered consecutively from 1 upward to 643, inclusive, in order of maturity, bonds numbered 1 to 157, inclusive, maturing in the years 1970 to 1975, inclusive, to bear interest from date at the rate of four and one-fourth per centum (4 1/4%) per annum and bonds numbered 158 to 643, inclusive, maturing in the years 1976 to 1986, inclusive, to bear interest from date at the rate of four and one-half per centum (4 1/2%) per annum, all interest payable July 1, 1969 and semi-annually thereafter on the lst days of January and July in each year and the principal to mature on the 1st day of January, lowest numbers first, in the years and amounts, as follows:







PROPOSED CHANGES IN THE STATUTES OF FLOYD JUNIOR COLLEGE

Article 1. THE COLLEGE

(Delete the present article and substitute the following:)

Section 1. Floyd Junior College is a unit of the University System of Georgia and is under the jurisdiction of the Board of Regents and the Chancellor of the University System of Georgia. As a two-year institution, Floyd Junior College confers the Associate of Arts and the Associate of Science degrees.

Section 2. Floyd Junior Gollege was established to provide opportunities for the physical, intellectual, and cultural development of the people in the community it serves. The offerings of the College are determined by evaluable resources and are governed by policies established by the Board of Regents. The College proposes to meet the educational and cultural needs of the community through the following programs:

> The College provides, through the concept of the University System Core Curriculum, the first two years of a four-year degree program. Gredits earned during these two years are transferable to senior colleges and universities.

The College provides, in accordance with demonstrated need, carear programs to prepare students for gainful employment.

The College provides developmental instruction designed for students who need to strengthen their scademic backgrounds before entering college level programs of study.

The College provides opportunities for members of the community it serves to participate in courses in continuing education. These courses are offered according to demonstrated need and available resources.

Article 111: THE COLLEGE FACULTY

(Delete Section 8, Paragraph 6 and substitute the following:)

d. Each full-time faculty member is employed for the academic year of three quarters only; and, if his services should be needed during the summer quarter, a separate contract will be made with him covering his services for the summer quarter. Services rendered during the summer quarter shall entitle a member of the faculty to thirty per cent of his regular salary for full-time employment or to a pro-rate share for port-time employment, payable during the summer quarter. The teaching load may be allotted in (1) the day program, (2) the evening program, or (3) the day and evening programs combined. Compensation will be earned at the rate of one-third of the total salary per academic quarter during the scademic year; however, compensation for the academic year of three quarters will be payable at the rate of one-twelfth of the contract sum at the end of each month from September through May and three-twelfths at the end of the contract period. Any services rendered for only a portion of an academic quarter will be companyated on a pro-rate basis of the contracted quarter rate.

(Delete Section 8, Paragraph f and substitute the following:)

- f. When an employee of the College has been incapacitated by illness or injury, his salary shall be continued in accordance with the provisions of the Folicies and By-Leve of the Ecard of Regents.
- (Delete Section S. Parsgraph j and substitute the following:)
 - j. All absences of a Faculty member from ordinary service in the Gollege shall be reported to his Division or Department Chairman and to the Dean. Members of the Faculty, unless excused by the President, are expected to attend all academic exercises of the College. The outside activities of Faculty members of Floyd Junior College are geverned by the following policy statement from the Policies and By-Laws of the Board of Regents: "The members of the Faculties shall not engage in any accupation, pursuit, or endeavor which will interfere with the regular and punctual discharge of their official duties."

(Delace Section 8, Faregraph a and substitute the following:)

- m. Each member of the Faculty and Administrative Staff is expected to become acquainted with and to conform to all rules and regulations of the Gollege and the Policies and By-Laws of the Board of Regente relating to intervision bis work. Copies of all rules and regulations shall be furnished to all faculty members, and copies of the Policies and By-Laws of the Board of Regents shall be made available to all faculty members.
- (Section 8, Satagraph a) Delete the entire paragraph.
- (Section 8, Paragraph o) Defete the entire paragraph.

Article IV. GERERAL ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICEES

(Delete Section 1 and substitute the following:)

Section 1. The administrative officers shall be as follows: the Deam of the College, the Director of Student Affairs, the Assistant Director of Student Affairs, the Comptroller, the Public Information Officer, the Director of Public Service, and such other officers as may be designated by the President with the approval of the Board of Regents.

Faculty status of full-time administrative officers will necessarily vary with the size and complexity of the institution. A faculty member who has academic rank and rights of tenure in the corps of instruction and who accepts appointment to an administrative office shall retain his academic rank and rights of tenure as an ex officio member of the corps of instruction but shall have no rights of tenure in the administrative office to which he has been appointed. An administrative officer having faculty status shall have all the responsibilities and privileges of faculty membership. Administrative officers shall be appointed by the President with the approval of the Board of Regents and shall hold office at the pleasure of the Fresident.

(Delete Section 2, Paragraph g and substitute the following:)

g. For each Faculty member of the College, he shall maintain a complete record of all activities relating to education, professional practice and research, publications, recognition received, membership and activity in learned societies, and special services randered, and may make this information available to other officially interested College officers. He shall be responsible for the continuous evaluation of the work and progress of the members of the corps of instruction.

(Delete Section 3, Faragraph a and substitute the following:)

a. Ne shall be responsible for the administration and coordination of student services and functions relating to admissions, orientation, registration, records, counseling, testing, financial aid, placement, student part-time amployment, student health, student activities, student organizations, student government, and student publications. He shall prepare and revise annually for approval through channels a Code of Student Conduct governing the conduct and discipline of students and shall be responsible for the administration of the Code.

(Delete Section 3A, Paragraph b and substitute the following:)

b. He shall assist the Director of Student Affairs in edministering the Code of Student Conduct.

(Delete Section 6, and substitute the following:)

Section 6. Any administrator may, with approval of the President, create advibory groups of a permanent or temperary nature to assist in making decisions within the perogetives of his office. When these advisory proups are of a permanent nature, they shall be called Councils. When these advisory groups are appointed to discharge specifically assigned duties over a relatively brief period of time, they shall be known as Ad Hoc Committees.



The Standing Committee for Statutes and Faculty Affairs met on September 21, 1971, at 10:30 a.m. for the primary purpose of electing new officers to serve on the Committee during the 1971-72 year.

Mr. Berry, the outgoing secretary of the Committee, read the minutes of the July 29, 1971 meeting. It was moved and seconded that the minutes be adopted as read. The motion passed.

Following the vote, one member questioned the propriety of adopting the minutes, pointing out that certain revisions in the College Statutes which had been approved in the last Committee meeting and which had subsequently been adopted by the faculty as a whole had not been included in the minutes. After much debate it was discovered that two versions of the final edition of the Statutes had been distributed, only one of which contained the final revisions to which the number had referred. Dr. Ready, who appeared to possess the only extant edition which incorporated all the approved revisions, promised to look into the matter and assured the Committee that an errata sheet rectifying the oversight would be distributed to all faculty members.

The next order of business was the election of new officers. Mr. Shelton nominated Mr. Fullen for the office of Chairman of the Committee. Mr. Martin seconded the nomination. Mr. Fullen was accordingly elected and Dr. Ready gradiously yielded the chair. Mr. Martin was appointed Secretary of the Committee by acclamation, Mr. Martin, with many modest protestations of his own unforthiness for such high office, etc., alone dissenting. Having been unfortunate enough to be the only member to bring writing materials to the meeting, Mr. Martin Immediately assumed the post previously occupied by Mr. Berry.

A question was raised concerning the length of Committee terms. One member commented that it was his understanding that members who had served on the Committee Last year were appointed for one-year terms this year, and that new members had been appointed for two-year terms. Another member expressed serious doubts doubt the existence of such a policy, pointing out that the Executive Corditee had made no specific recommendations concerning the staggering 4 committee terms. After further discussion, Dr. Ready, acting in an adv/30ry capacity, suggested that the Committee formulate a policy coverid, the length of committee terms and forward it for recommended adoption by the Executive Committee. It was the consensus of the Committee the such a policy should be formulated, pursuant to Article III, Section 92, , Magraph 5, of the College Statutes, and that said policy be submitted to the faculty as a whole for recommended approval.

It was moved that the Committee wait until its next meeting to formulate such a policy. The motion died for lack of a second.

One member suggested that the Committee set up a machinery for allowing members of committees to resign. A motion was made and seconded that the following sentence be inserted between sentence one and sentence 'wo of paragraph d, Section 9, Article III of the College Statutes: "A faculty member appointed to serve on a committee may resign from that committee at the end of the first year of his service." The motion generated a marathon discussion. One member suggested that Article III, Section 9A, paragraph f, of the College Statutes would seem to precive such action of the Committee. It was finally decided that Article IV, Section 6 of the College Statutes vested the power to recommend such changes to the Executive Committee. After sundry points of view on the matter of committee resignations had been presented, the motion was defeated.

It was decided that further action be postponed until the next Committee meeting, the time and place of which the Chairman was given authority to decide.

The Committee approved the following changes in the Statutes: Under the title on page 1 the following statement is to appear: "These statutes are expressly subject to the policies and by-laws of the Board of Regents of the University System of Georgia and amendments thereto."

ARTICLE II, SECTION 3

Paragraph <u>g</u> was changed to read as follows: "He shall have the right and authority, with the approval of the Chancellor, to fill Faculty vacancies between meetings of the Board of Regents with the understanding that these appointments shall be subject to approval of that Board."

ARTICLE III, SECTION 4

Paragraph <u>b</u> was changed to read as follows: "The academic year embraces the Fall, Winter, and Spring Quarters, each of which is approximately eleven weeks in length. The year begins with the first day of Fall Quarter. Three Quarters' contracts will normally be effective with the opening of the Fall Quarter. Compensation for services during an academic year is payable in twelve equal installments."

ARTICLE III, SECTION 8

Paragraph c was changed to read as follows: "The leave policy at this institution shall be that set forth by the Board of Regents policy manual."

ARTICLE III, SECTION 7

A motion to change puragraphs b, c, d, e, and f was tabled, so as to permit committee members to study the wording of the proposed changes.

The committee adjourned at 11:30 am.

(1) The following changes relating to Tom Berry's job description were approved:

ARTICLE IV Change the present Section 6 to Section 7. Add the following Section 6 Section 6. PUBLIC SERVICE DIRECTOR

- a. The Public Service Director shall be responsible for implementing and coordinating public service programs that integrate the college and the community into one service unit.
- b. He shall be appointed by the President with the approval of the Board of Regents. He shall be directly responsible to the Dean.
- c. He shall be a member of the College Faculty and any committees as may be deemed necessary.
- d. Es shall study continuing educational needs and desires of the community and translate them into workable cultural, physical, intellectual, professional, or creative educational programs.
- e. Ea shall acquire instructors and coordinate physical facilities for the presentation of these programs from the College Faculty, local community, or other institutions.
- f. He shall maintain complete records for all continuing education units.
- g. He shall be responsible for submitting to the President an annual report concerning the activities of his office.

ARTICLE IV, Section 2, delete n as it presently reads and add:

n. He shall, in consultation with the Director of Public Service, exercise control over all funds allocated to Public Service, prepare the annual Public Service budget and recommend the appointment, reappointment, promotion, or dismissal of the Public Service staff.

ARTICLE II., add the following section:

Section 91 Public Service Committee

- a. The Public Service Committee shall consist of the Public Service Director, who shall serve as Chairman, two representatives from each Academic Division, and one from the Department of Physical Education.
- b. The committee shall act in an advisory capacity to the Director of Fublic Service concerning the Public Service Program.
- (2) Approved recommended Change in Article III, Section 8 (see attached dittoed sheet).
- (3) Defeated proposal for addition of paragraph f in Article III, Section 9E (same sheet).
- (4) Voted to omit the words in a class III institution from Article III, Section 4, paragraph a, no. 1 (as amended on October 23, 1972).
- (5) Approved changes in Article III, Section 7, paragraphs d, e, f. Changes are on attached pages.

This is a charified statement of the recommendation under consideration when the last Committee meeting adjourned.

Recommended Change in Article III, Section 8 (p. 5 in current Statutes) Omit the paragraphs lettered g, <u>h</u>, <u>i</u> in the current Statutes. Add the following paragraph under the designation of g.

The following is college policy concerning academic freedom.

- 1. A member of the Faculty is free to express, inside or outside the classroom, his opinion on any matter that falls within the fields of knowledge which he is employed to teach and to study, subject only those restrictions that are imposed by high professional ethics, fair-mindedness, common sense, accurate expression, and a generous respect for the rights, feelings, and opinions of others. The Faculty member should be careful in his teaching to deal adequately with the course matter as described in the College catalogue and to maintain respect for varying opinions on controversial matters. He should emphasize the fact that the opinion which he expresses is personal and not institutional. (THIS IS THE PRESENT PARAGRAPH g.)
- Each teacher should maintain a reputation for scholarship through continuous research and study. The teacher is entitled to full freedom in research and in publication of the results. This research and study should yield results in improved teaching.
- 3. <u>A Faculty member</u> acting individually or in concert with others, who clearly obstructs or disrupts, or attempts to obstruct or disrupt any teaching, research, administrative, disciplinary <u>activity</u>, any public service octivity, or any other activity authorized to be discharged or held on this College campus is considered by the College to have committed an act of gross irresponsibility and shall be subject to disciplinary procedures, possibly resulting in dismissal or termination of employment.

(THIS IS THE PRESENT PARAGRAPH h with the changes which are underlined.)

4. Disputations concerning academic freedom may be appealed to the Statutes and Faculty Affairs Committee. Recommendations shall be made according to the procedures outlined in Article III, Section 9E, paragraph e.

The last item on p. 2 of the recommendations from the Starnes, Hays, and Kennard sub-committee was not acted upon at the last meeting.

Item 5. p. 8 - Article III, Section 9E, add paragraph f.

f. Whenever greivances arise between faculty members, the aggrieved faculty member may present the grievances to this Committee. The Committee will make recommendations according to the procedure outlined in paragraph <u>e</u>.

Recommendations for Statutes changes - from Pullen, Boyd, Schuller

ARTICLE III, Section 7 (page 4 of present Statutes)

Delete paragraphs d. e, f, and substitute the following paragraphs: (The following paragraphs are from Armstrong's Section 7, page 13.)

d. Suspension and Removal of Faculty members

- 1. The President of Floyd Junior College may at any time remove any faculty member or other employee of the institution for cause by giving written notice, by certified mail, to be devlivered to the addressee only with receipt to show to whom and when delivered, and address where delivered, clearly stating the charges against the person to be removed and notifying such person that he may file an appeal in writing within ten days after the date of the receipt of such notice and charges to the Board of Regents for a fair hearing before said Board or a committee of the Board, within forty-five days from the date of filing such an appeal. Said employee shall be suspended from employment without pay from the date of receipt of such notice and charges. Should said employee be reinstated by action of the Board of Regents, he shall be compensated from the date of the suspension. The action of the Board shall be final.
- 2. When a faculty member is charged with the violation of any State of Federal law, or is indicted for any such offense. a thorough review of the circumstances shall be carried out by the Fresideat and Chancellor. This review may lead to a temporary suspension of the faculty member from his teaching duties. Further, if the President doems that, in his best judgment, any faculty member poses immediate harm to bimself or others in the continuance of his duties, he may, after consultation with the Chancellor, temporarily suspend that faculty member.

In the event a faculty member is temporatily suspended, the President shall immediately convene the Statutes and Faculty Affairs Committee for the purpose of hearing an appeal by the faculty member. The appeal shall be submitted in writing in accordance with procedures to be established by the hearing committee which shall render its decision within ten days from the conclusion of the hearing. The President may or may not approve the recommendation of the hearing committee. If he does not approve he may state his reasons for not doing so in writing to the hearing committee for a response before rendering a final dicision. If he decides to continue the suspension, he will so notify the faculty member who shall then have the right of appeal to the Board of Regentry. If the faculty member decides to appeal, he may file his appeal in writing with the Executive Secretary of the Board within ten days after notification of the President's decision. The President shall forward the entire record of the matter to the Executive Secretary of the Board for consideration by the Board or a committee of the Board who shall hear the appeal within forty-five days from the filing date of the second of the case with the Executive Secretary.

e. Adequate cause for dismissal will be related directly and substantially to the fitness of the faculty member in his professional capacity as a teacher or researcher. Dismissal will not be used to restrain faculty members in their exercise of academic freedom or other rights of American citizens.

Recommendations from Pullen, Doyd, Schuller - page 2

A dismissal, as defined in this section, should be preceded by a state of reasons or charges, and the Faculty member concerned will have the right to be heard by the Statutes and Faculty Affairs Committee. A member of this committee will remove himself from the case, either at the request of a party of a his own initiative, if he decas himself disqualified for bias or interest. That is lowing rules will govern the procedure for a dismissal hearing:

- 1. Service of notice of the hearing with specific reasons or charges ag inst the faculty member in writing will be made at least ten (10) days pror to the hearing. The Eaculty member may waive a hearing or may respond to the charges in writing at any time before the hearing. If the faculty member waives a hearing, but denies the charges against him or assuris that the charges do not support a finding of adequate cause, the hearing tribunal will evaluate all available evidence and rest its recommendation upon the evidence in the record.
- 2. The hearing committee, in consultation with the President and the Seculty member, may exercise its judgment as to whether the hearing should be public or private.
- 3. During the proceedings the Faculty member will be permitted to have in academic advisor or other personal advisor of his own choice. The divisor may not participate directly in the proceedings.
- 4. A tape recording, brief of evidence, or summary transcript of the proceedings will be kept and made available to the faculty member and the administration in the event that an appeal is filed.
- 5. The hearing tribunal may grant adjournments to enable either party to investigate evidence as to which a valid claim of surprise is made.
- 6. The Faculty member and the administration will be afforded an opportunity to obtain necessary witnesses and documentary or other evidence.
- 7. The faculty member and the administration will have the right to confront and to cross-examine all witnesses. Where the witness cannot or while not appear and the committee determines that the interests of justice require the admission of his statement, the committee may by affidavit record the sworn statement of the witness.
- 8. In the hearing of charges of incompetence, the testimony may include that of qualified faculty members from this or other institutions of higher education.
- 9. The hearing committee will not be bound by formal rules of legal evidence and may admit any evidence which is of probative value in determining the issues involved.
- 10. The findings of fact and the decision of the hearing committee will be based solely on the hearing record.
- 11. Except for such simple announcements as may be required, covering the time of the hearing and similar matters, public statements and publicity about the case by either the faculty member or the administrative officers should be avoided until the proceedings have been completed, including consideration by the Board of Regents. The President and the faculty member will be

notified of the decision in writing and upon request be given a copy of the base recording or the record of the hearing.

Recommendations from Pullen, Boyd, Schuller - page 3

(f. continued)

12. If the hearing committee concludes that adequate cause for dismissal has not been established by the evidence in the record, it shall so report to the President. If the President does not approve the report, he may state his reasons for doing so, in writing, to the hearing committee before rendering his final decision. If the hearing committee concludes that adequate cause for dismissal has been established, but that an academic penalty less than dismissal would be more appropriate, it may so recommend with supporting reasons. The President may or may not follow such recommendations.

PROPOSED CHANGES IN THE STATUTES OF FLOYD JUNIOR COLLEGE

Article I. THE COLLEGE

(Delete the present article and substitute the following:)

Section 1. Floyd Junior College is a unit of the University System of Georgia and is under the jurisdiction of the Board of Regents and the Chancellor of the University System of Georgia. As a two-year institution, Floyd Junior College confers the Associate of Arts and the Associate of Science degrees.

Section 2.

Floyd Junior College was established to provide opportunities for the physical, intellectual, and cultural development of the people in the community it serves. The offerings of the College are determinded by available resources and are governed by policies established by the Board of Regents. The College proposes to meet the educational and cultural needs of the community through the following programs:

> The College provides, through the concept of the University System Core Curriculum, the first two years of a four-year degree program. Credits earned during these two years are transferable to senior colleges and universities.

The College provides, in accordance with demonstrated need, career programs to prepare students for gainful employment.

The College provides developmental instruction designed for students who need to strengthen their academic backgrounds before entering college level programs of study.

The College provides opportunities for members of the community it serves to participate in courses in continuing education. These courses are offered according to demonstrated need and available resources.

Article III. THE COLLEGE FACULTY

(Delete Section 8, Paragraph d and substitute the following:)

d.

Each full-time faculty member is employed for the academic year of three quarters only; and, if his services should be needed during the summer quarter, a separate contract will be made with him covering his services for the summer quarter. Services rendered during the summer quarter shall entitle a member of the faculty to thirty per cent of his regular salary for full-time employment or to a pro-rata share for part-time employment, payable during the summer quarter. The teaching load may be allotted in (1) the day program, (2) the evening program, or (3) the day and evening programs combined. Compensation will be earned at the rate of one-third of the total salary per academic quarter during the academic year; however, compensation for the academic year of three quarters will be payable at the rate of one-twelfth of the contract sum at the end of each month from September through May and three-twelfths at the end of the contract period. Any services rendered for only a portion of an academic quarter will be compensated on a pro-rata basis of the contracted quarter rate.

(Delete Section 8, Paragraph f and substitute the following:)

f. When an employee of the College has been incapacitated by illness or injury, his salary shall be continued in accordance with the provisions of the Policies and By-Laws of the Board of Regents.

(Delete Section 8, Paragraph j and substitute the following:)

j. All absences of a Faculty member from ordinary service in the College shall be reported to his Division or Department Chairman and to the Dean. Members of the Faculty, unless excused by the President, are expected to attend all academic exercises of the College. The outside activities of Faculty members of Floyd Junior College are governed by the following policy statement from the Policies and By-Laws of the Board of Regents: "The members of the Faculties shall not engage in any occupation, pursuit, or endeavor which will interfere with the regular and punctual discharge of their official duties."

(Delete Section 8, Paragraph m and substitute the following:)

m. Each member of the Faculty and Administrative Staff is expected to become acquainted with and to conform to all rules and regulations of the College and the Policies and By-Laws of the Board of Regents relating to himself and his work. Copies of all rules and regulations shall be furnished to all faculty members, and copies of the Policies and By-Laws of the Board of Regents shall be made available to all faculty members.

(Section 8, Paragraph n) Delete the entire paragraph.

(Section 8, Paragraph o) Delete the entire paragraph.

Article IV. GENERAL ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICERS

(Delete Section 1 and substitute the following:)

Section 1. The administrative officers shall be as follows: the Dean of the College, the Director of Student Affairs, the Assistant Director

of Student Affairs, the Comptroller, the Public Information Officer, the Director of Public Service, and such other officers as may be designated by the President with the approval of the Board of Regents.

Faculty status of full-time administrative officers will necessarily vary with the size and complexity of the institution. A faculty member who has academic rank and rights of tenure in the corps of instruction and who accepts appointment to an administrative office shall retain his academic rank and rights of tenure as an ex officio member of the corps of instruction but shall have no right of tenure in the administrative office to which he has been appointed. An administrative officer having faculty status shall have all the responsibilities and privileges of faculty membership. Administrative officers shall be appointed by the President with the approval of the Board of Regents and shall hold office at the pleasure of the President.

(Delete Section 2, Paragraph g and substitute the following:)

Section 6.

For each Faculty member of the College, he shall maintain a complete record of all activities relating to education, professional practice and research, publications, recognition received, membership and activity in learned societies, and special services rendered, and may make this information available to other officially interested College officers. He shall be responsible for the continuous evaluation of the work and progress of the members of the corps of instruction.

(Delete Section 3, Paragraph a and substitute the following:)

He shall be responsible for the administration and coordination of student services and functions relating to admissions, orientation, registration, records, counseling, testing, financial aid, placement, student part-time employment, student health, student activities, student organizations, student government, and student publications. He shall prepare and revise annually for approval through channels a Code of Student Conduct governing the conduct and discipline of students and shall be responsible for the administration of the Code.

(Delete Section 3A, Paragraph b and substitute the following:) b. Me shall assist the Director of Student Affairs in administering the come Code of Student Conduct. Selecte b. Change C to b.

(Delete Section 6, and substitute the following:)

Any administrator may, with approval of the President, create advisory groups of a permanent or temporary nature to assist in making decisions within the perogative of his office. When these advisory groups are of a permanent nature, they shall be called Councils. When these advisory groups are appointed to discharge specifically assigned duties over a relatively brief period of time, they shall be known as Ad Hoc Committees.

- 1. p. 17 Article IV, Section 1. Omit the first paragraph. Substitute the following paragraph:
 - Section 1. The administrative officers shall be as follows: the President, the Dean of the College, the Librarian, the Division Chairmen and Department Directors, the Director of Public Service, the Director of Student Affairs, the Assistant Director of Student Affairs, the Comptroller, the Public Information Officer, and such other officers as may be designated by the President with the approval of the Board of Regents.
- 2. Add a Section 2C entitled Division Chairmen and Department Directors. Move the items in paragraph b of the present Article III, Section 10 and put them under Section 2C of Article IV, with the following changes: Omit the b. Change numbers 1-10 to letters a-j. Leave the a. paragraph in Article III, Section 10, but drop the a. designation.
- 3. Change the present Section 6 in Article IV to Section 2D. There will then be no Section 6 in Article IV.
