PERCENTAGE OF STUDENTS PASSING FIRST CORE CURRICULUM COURSE 1988-1989









Course Identification:

Designate the first course that provides Core Curriculum credit in English. For mathematics and social science, designate the two entry-level Core Curriculum courses that typically have the highest enrollments. (If there is only one entry-level Core Curriculum course in mathematics, designate only one course.)

Student Classification:

Students must be classified separately for the three types of courses. For each of the three types of courses, (English, math, and social science), classify a student as "Regular" if he or she did not enroll in an area of Developmental Studies prerequisite to this course. Classify a student as having a Developmental Studies prerequisite if the student enrolled in a Developmental Studies area(s) prerequisite to this course. Note that in this section a student may be classified as a Developmental Studies student for one area and a regular student for another.

Determining Pass Rates:

Consider a course "passed" if the student received credit for it and does not need to repeat it for graduation credit. (A "D" should be considered a passing grade unless the institutions requires the student to repeat the course for graduation credit.) Do not count grades of "I" or "W" in these calculations; consider a "WF" as a failure. If a student repeats a course within a fiscal year, count each attempt.

Developmental Studies Annual Report Summary

Attached is the 1989-1990 Developmental Studies Annual Report Summary. This summary was prepared from survey responses submitted by each institution and data from the Student Information Reporting System (SIRS).

The report reveals that, although a substantial percentage of entering freshmen enrolled in Developmental Studies, most students were successful in completing the requirements after only one or two quarters in a Developmental Studies area. In addition, those students who enrolled in Developmental Studies before taking college-level work were only slightly less successful in their Core Curriculum coursework than students who did not need Developmental Studies. It appears that Developmental Studies continues to serve an important purpose in providing access to college for those students who are not initially admissable to the University System of Georgia's regular programs.

DEVELOPMENTAL STUDIES

1989-1990 ANNUAL REPORT SUMMARY

Each summer quarter, University System institutions are requested to complete a Developmental Studies Annual Report survey, which includes information on the number of students in each Developmental Studies subject area, the number of students exiting Developmental Studies, and the success of former Developmental Studies students who take Core Curriculum courses. This summary is based primarily on the institutional surveys from Summer Quarter, 1989, through Spring Quarter, 1990, along with data from the Student Information Reporting System (SIRS).

Shown in Table 1 are the percentages of entering freshmen enrolled in Developmental Studies in 1989-1990. The percentages of students by subject area, as well as the total percentage of students enrolled in at least one Developmental Studies course, are provided for each institution. Systemwide, 46% of the entering freshmen students enrolled in at least one Developmental Studies course. This percentage includes students who "volunteered" or were advised to enroll in Developmental Studies as well as students who were required to enroll in Developmental Studies. Approximately 59% of the two-year college, 46% of the senior college, and 19% of the university entering freshmen enrolled in at least one Developmental Studies course. The System percentage of students in Developmental Studies increased 4% from 1988-1989 to 1989-1990; while the university and senior college percentages were stable, the percentage of students in Developmental Studies at the two-year college level increased by 6%. (The percentages are slight overestimates because they include those Developmental Studies students who were transfer students in addition to those who were beginning freshmen. Freshman transfer students are screened for Developmental Studies placement if they have not completed the College Preparatory Curriculum in English and mathematics or if they do not meet other criteria established by institutions.) Systemwide, more

students enrolled in Developmental Studies courses in mathematics (34%) than in English (22%) or reading (18%). The increase in the Developmental Studies enrollment in 1989-1990 was primarily in the area of mathematics, especially at the two-year college level.

There is substantial variability across institutions, even among those of the same type, in the percentage of students enrolled in Developmental Studies. While some of this variability is related to differences in the qualifications of students, much of the variability is a result of different standards used to place students in Developmental Studies. For example, a few institutions require that all entering freshmen be screened with the Collegiate Placement Examination (CPE), and some institutions have substantially higher SAT or CPE requirements than others. Thus, the higher percentages of students in Developmental Studies at some institutions result from the use of higher standards to place students.

Shown in Table 2 are the exit rates for students who entered Developmental Studies in Fall Quarter, 1988. Only students who attended full-time in Fall, 1988, and who had not attended college previously are included. Systemwide, 63% of these students had exited Developmental Studies as of Spring Quarter, 1990.

Although students are allowed up to four quarters in Developmental Studies before initial suspension, many students need only one quarter of Developmental Studies work. Shown in Table 3 and summarized in Figure 1 are the number of quarters spent in Developmental Studies for students who exited in 1989-1990. In English and reading, a majority of the students who exited did so after only one quarter. In mathematics, 38% exited after one quarter and 76% exited by the second quarter. The lower one-quarter exit rate in mathematics is at least in part a function of the curriculum: at some institutions, all Developmental Studies mathematics students are required to complete a two-quarter sequence of courses before being eligible for exit. In each of the three subject areas, over 90% of student who exited did so by the end of three quarters.

The exit data shown in Tables 2 and 3 indicate substantial variability across institutions and types of institutions. These differences in exit rates across institutions reflect not only any differences in the qualifications of students attending the institutions but also differences in the requirements for Developmental Studies placement and exit.

An indication of the success of students who completed Developmental Studies is their performance in Core Curriculum coursework. Shown in Table 4 and summarized in Figure 2 are the percentages of former Developmental Studies and non-Developmental Studies students passing the first Core Curriculum course in English, social science, and mathematics. (Students are shown as former Developmental Studies students in English or mathematics if they took a Developmental Studies course in the area. For students enrolled in Developmental Studies reading, social science was used as the first Core Curriculum course. A "D" grade is considered a passing grade unless the institution requires the student to repeat the course for graduation credit.) Again, there is considerable variability in passing rates of both Developmental Studies and non-Developmental Studies students across institutions. In general, while the Developmental Studies students performed somewhat lower than other students, most of the former Developmental Studies students were successful in their first Core Curriculum courses.



SUBJECT: Changes in Developmental Studies Placement Procedures

The following two changes in the procedures for screening students for Developmental Studies are to be implemented with Summer Quarter, 1988 admissions:

- 1. The Board of Regents has approved a change in the minimum SAT scores required for regular freshmen admission without further screening for Developmental Studies. Effective with admission for Summer Quarter, 1988, students scoring below 350 on either section of the SAT (or below comparable scores on the ACT) must be screened for Developmental Studies placement. The previous policy required Developmental Studies screening for students with SAT scores below 330.
- 2. The Collegiate Placement Examination (CPE) will replace the Basic Skills Examination for Developmental Studies placement and exit testing. The System minimum score on the English, Reading, and Mathematics CPE is a scale score of 75.

Institutions are urged to be cautious in setting scores on the SAT and CPE above the System minimums for 1988 admissions. Both the admissions policy and the placement tests are new, and the effects of the changes on the Developmental Studies program are not known. The new admissions policy, for example, requires CPE testing for two group of students not previously subject to testing: those with College Preparatory Curriculum deficiencies in English or mathematics and those who have been out of school for five years and have not taken the SAT. In addition, the effects of the new test cannot be predicted with great precision. Although the fall quarter experimental testing of the CPE provided information about the potential effects of the new tests, there were many problems with the data collected that may have influenced the results of the analyses.

Except for those institutions that must raise their minimum SAT scores for exemption of Developmental Studies screening to 350, it is recommended that institutions maintain their current SAT requirements for Developmental Studies placement.


Provided below is information showing the estimated relationship between BSE and CPE scores for the range of minimum BSE scores currently used. As this table indicates, the new minimum score of 75 on the CPE corresponds approximately to a 67 on the BSE in reading and in English and a 71 on the BSE in mathematics. If your institution's current BSE minimum scores are less than these, the institution's CPE minimum scores should be set at the new System minimums. If your minimum scores are above these BSE scores, the table may be used as a guide in setting CPE scores higher than the System minimum scores. However, caution should be used in setting higher scores given the lack of experience with the new tests.

University System Developmental Studies Procedure I.C. states, "Transcripts for all students screened for Developmental Studies shall include placement and current status in each Developmental Studies area in a system-approved format." Previously, the Developmental Studies testing information was to be maintained in the system-approved format on the student's permanent record. Beginning Summer Quarter, 1990, the information is to be posted on the transcripts of all entering students screened for Developmental Studies.

The approved format requires that the following information be placed on a student's transcript each time the student takes the Collegiate Placement Examination (CPE).

- 1. Name of Test (CPE)
- 2. Type of Test (English, Reading, Mathematics)
- 3. Scale Score
- 4. Date of Test
- 5. Identification (E, X, P, L, U, N,)

The definitions of the Identification codes are:

- E = Exited Developmental Studies area after successfully completing all required coursework and CPE.
- X = Exempted Developmental Studies area by scoring high enough on CPE and meeting other institutional requirements for exemption.
- P = Placed in Developmental Studies area.
- L = Area was satisfied through alternative procedures approved by the Chancellor for international students and students whose native language is not English.
- U = Unsuccessful exit attempt
- N = Career degree student who did not exempt Developmental Studies in this area but whose program does not require Developmental Studies in this area.

An actual entry on the transcript would appear as follows: CPER/68/0990/P. This entry indicates that the Collegiate Placement Examination in Reading was administered in September, 1990, and that the student received a scale score of 68 and was placed in Developmental Studies Reading.



DELEGIE AND SELECTION

- Each institution in the University System of Georgia shall 1. have a separate department/division of Developmental Studies. This department/division shall be charged with helping those students admitted to its program to attain predetermined levels of competence in writing, reading, and mathematics.
- The department* shall have a separate budget and staff. The 2. chairman ** shall report directly to the chief academic officer of the institution or his her designee.
- Any entering freshman scoring below 330 on either the SAT-V or SAT-M shall be required to take an additional test*** prescribed by the Board of Regents to determine whether he/ she will be a general admissions or Developmental Studies student. All institutions shall maintain the right to determine their own standards of admission within the guidelines set by the Board of Recents.
- The Board of Regents shall establish system-wide minimum 4. scores on the prescribed placement test for acceptance for general admission. A student scoring below the system minimum on any section of the test shall be classified as a Developmental Studies student.

Institutions may specify higher standards and may impose additional measures for placement of students in general admissions or Developmental Studies.

- Courses in the Developmental Studies program shall include but not be limited to English, reading, and mathematics. Institutions should be responsive to the special needs of Developmental Studies students for personal, financial, academic and career counseling.
- Developmental Studies departments/divisions shall provide academic advisement to insure that students are informed about their Developmental Studies requirements and to interpret to the students Developmental Studies regulations.

^{*}Department refers to department or division.

^{**}Chairman refers to the academic officer responsible for

Developmental Studies.

^{***}Test currently is the Basic Skills Examination, an Achievement Test developed by the University System of Georgia.

- 7. No degree credit shall be earned in Developmental Studies courses, but institutional credit shall be awarded.
- 8. Developmental Studies students shall be required to take Developmental Studies courses designed to increase competency in areas where they have demonstrated weaknesses.
- 9. Until Developmental Studies requirements have been satisfied, students shall not be permitted to take credit courses which require the content or the skills of the Developmental Studies courses as prerequisites. Institutions shall identify those courses which have one or more Developmental Studies courses as prerequisites.
- 10. A student may not accumulate more than thirty (30) hours of degree credit courses before finishing Developmental Studies courses. A student who accumulates thirty (30) degree credit hours and has not completed required Developmental Studies courses, may enroll only in Developmental Studies courses until requirements are complete.
- 11. In order to exit Developmental Studies courses, students must satisfy the institution's requirements for each courses.

To exit a Developmental Studies area (mathematics, reading, English), students must score at least the system minimum on the appropriate part of the prescribed test. An exit writing sample is also required in Developmental Studies English.

- 12. Students who do not complete requirements for a Developmental Studies area (reading, English, mathematics) after four attempts shall be excluded from Developmental Studies and from programs which include courses for which there are Developmental Studies proceduisites. Institutions may devise stricter standards for excluding students who are not making satisfactory progress in completing their Developmental Studies courses.
- 13. All rime apent in Developmental Studies course work shall be summictive within the University System. Students shall not be allowed more than four (4) quarters in any one area. Each institution may establish remaining policies for Developmental Studies students so long as a student is not considered for remaining in any unit of the University System in less than one condemic year.
- 14. University System of Georgia Special Studies Report Summer and Fall 1978

The attached tables answer the following questions related to the University System of Georgia Special Studies Program:

Table I

How many students were asked to withdraw and/or dropped out of Special Studies on their own accord during Summer Quarter 1978?

Answer:

A total of three hundred and twelve (312) students withdrew during Summer Quarter 1978. Three (3) percent of the black and two (2) percent of the "other" withdrew. Forty (40) percent of the total who dropped out were required to do so.

Table II

How many students completed their final Special Studies requirements during Summer Quarter 1978?

Answer:

During Summer Quarter, five hundred and six (506) students completed their final Special Studies requirements. Four (4) percent of the black and four (4) percent of the "other" students enrolled completed requirements. Thirty-five (35) percent completing were black and sixty-five (65) percent were "other." Note: Thirty-eight (38) percent of the students enrolled in Special Studies during the Summer Quarter were black.

Table III

How many students exited Special Studies <u>mathematics</u> Summer Quarter 1978?

Answer:

Four hundred and twenty-six (426) students completed mathematics requirements during the quarter. This was sixty-one (61) percent of the total number of students attempting mathematics exit examination. Fifty-four (54) percent of the blacks and seventy (70) percent of the "other" who attempted the exit criteria exited mathematics. Of the total who exited, thirty-five (35) percent were black and sixty-five (65) percent were "other." Although they had passed the exit test,

How many students took placement test(s), tested into Special Studies, but did not show for Fall Quarter registration?

Answer:

A total of seven hundred and twenty-two (722) students did not show. Forty-four (44) percent were black.

How many students are classified "Special Studies" but are not taking Special Studies courses this quarter?

Answer:

Six hundred and ninety-nine (699) students were required, but did not take Special Studies courses this quarter.

Table VII

What was the average size of classes in mathematics, reading, English, and support services during Fall Ouarter?

Answer:

The average class sizes were: support services 22, mathematics 25, reading 20, and English 21. The ranges were: mathematics 4-46, reading 3-35, and English 3-31.

During Fall Quarter 1978, six thousand, eight hundred and ninety-two (6,892) students were enrolled in mathematics, four thousand, nine hundred and eighty (4,980) in reading, six thousand, two hundred and thirty-four (6,234) in English and one thousand, seven hundred and seventy (1,770) in support services courses.

SUBJECT: Status of Advisory Committee Recommendations

As you recall, the Academic Advisory Committee on Special Studies recommended to the Chancellor the following items:

- a) that the 650 composite S. A. T. score used for initially screening students for Special Studies be replaced by part scores of 320 verbal and 320 quantitative, (STATUS: Still before the presidents and Chancellor for their consideration)
- b) that the system-wide Special Studies English exit criteria be amended to include the evaluation of writing through the use of a writing sample test(s), (STATUS: Still before the presidents and Chancellor Simpson for their consideration)
- c) that the Basic Skills Examination replace the CGP effective for winter quarter 1978 placement. (STATUS: Approved by Chancellor Simpson and is now in effect)

Regarding items A and B, I am sure you are aware that individual institutions already have the authority to implement these changes. I will inform you if and when any further system-wide action is taken on these two matters.

RE: Setting Institutional Cutoff Scores for Basic Skills Examination

On Thursday, September 8, 1977, at Macon Junior College, fourteen (14) Special Studies Department Heads met to discuss various aspects of our new Basic Skills Examination (BSE). The most crucial item discussed was the setting of institutional cutoff scores for the BSE.

Several schools represented at the meeting had begun using the BSE, either alone or in addition to the CGP. Individuals shared their experiences with others present. It appeared that results were somewhat different than what were anticipated. In some cases, students performed better on the BSE than what was warranted based on their performance on the CGP and in class. During the discussion explanations for these occurrences were studied.

The following conclusions were reached: (1) that because of the absence of a perfect equating method and the differences in what the BSE and CGP measure, the information in the equating table in the BSE User's Manual should be considered only estimates and starting points.

- (2) that each institution will need to determine (based on research and experience) what specific cutoffs it should use for the BSE, (Note: For the four or five schools present which had established tentative cutoffs, the scale scores on the BSE generally fell between 65 and 70.)
- (3) and that, by and large, faculty, students and administrators had very positive attitudes towards the BSE and any problems can be resolved as the test development activities continue.

The following suggestions were made: (1) that, when possible during fall quarter, institutions administer the CGP and the BSE in order to collect data to be compared as they attempt to establish cutoffs, (Note: Other tests such as the Nelson-Denny may also be used.)

(2) that documentation of cutoff setting procedures be kept in order to share with other institutions, (Note: Mel Williams, June Sparks, Morgan Stapleton and Bill Wheeler have agreed to share their approaches to setting cutoffs with anyone who may be interested.)

(3) and that, when questions, comments and/or suggestions arise regarding the BSE, these be shared with Bob Rentz and me in writing or by telephone.

I trust that this summary of our meeting will be beneficial to all of us. Please let me reiterate that the equating table represents our best estimates based on experimental data analysis and that each institution is responsible for establishing its cutoffs such as it did for the CGP.

Thank you for your patience and cooperation as we continue to improve our Special Studies Program.

Remember, we began formally counting Special Studies fall quarter 1974, although some schools began fall 1973.

I also need any information which you might have regarding the amount of time (in quarters) it takes students to exit Special Studies. I am particularly interested in how long it takes by the number of Special Studies course requirements they have. For instance, how long it takes the average student who has two course requirements as opposed to ones with one and three requirements.

If you have any data related to these two questions, please share them with us as soon as possible. And, if you have other data related to retention and graduation please also share them.

University System of Georgia Special Studies Report Fall and Winter 1976 - 1977

The attached tables answer the following questions related to the University System of Georgia Special Studies Program:

Table I -- How many students were asked to withdraw and/or dropped out of Special Studies on their own accord during Fall Quarter 1976?

Answer:

Answer:

A total of 773 students withdrew during Fall Quarter 1976. Seven (7) percent of each group, black and "other" withdrew. Forty percent of the total who dropped out were required to do so.

Table II -- How many students completed their final Special Studies requirements during Fall Quarter 1976?

During Fall Quarter, 2,384 students completed their final Special Studies requirements. Twenty (20%) percent of the black and 22% of the "other" students enrolled completed requirements. Fortyone (41%) completing were black and 59% were "other". Note: Forty-three (43%) of the students enrolled in Special Studies during the Fall Quarter were black.

Table III -- How many students exited Special Studies <u>mathematics</u> Fall Quarter 1976?

Answer:

Two-thousand, ninety-seven (2,097) students completed mathematics requirements during the quarter. This was 57% of the total number of students attempting mathematics exit examination. Fifty-one (51%) of the blacks and 66% of the "other" who attempted the exit criteria exited mathematics. Of the total who exited, 50% were black and 50% were "other". Two-hundred, ninety (290) students were not permitted to exit, although they had passed the exit test, because of incomplete course requirements. Forty-three percent (43%) were black.

-- How many students are classified "Special Studies" but are not taking Special Studies courses this quarter?

Answer:

Nine-hundred, sixty students were required, but did not take Special Studies Courses this quarter.

Table VII -- What was the average size of classes in mathematics, reading, English, and support services during Winter Ouarter?

Answer:

The average class sizes were: support services 17, mathematics 22, reading 18, and English 20. The ranges were: mathematics 3-33, reading 4-26, English 6-29, and support services 9-27.

During Winter Quarter 1977, 4,936 students were enrolled in mathematics, 3,715 in reading, 4,818 in English and 1,001 in support services courses.

Table IX -- How many students, still required to participate in Special Studies, who were enrolled the past quarter did not return for the current quarter?

Answer:

A total of 1,486 students enrolled in Special Studies during Fall Quarter 1977 did not return to school the following Winter Quarter. Forty percent of these were black and sixty percent were "other". Eightyseven percent of the black students enrolled Fall Quarter were retained Winter Quarter and seventy-five percent of the "other" students were retained. The average percentage of the total group of students retained was eighty-two percent.

How many students were asked to withdraw and/or dropped out of Special Studies on their own accord during Winter Quarter 1977?

Answer:

A total of 744 students withdrew during Winter Quarter 1977. Nine (9) percent of the black and 7% of the "other" withdrew. Thirty-three percent of the total who dropped out were required to do so.

Table II

How many students completed their final Special Studies requirements during Winter Quarter 1977?

Answer:

During Winter Quarter, 1,979 students completed their final Special Studies requirements. Nineteen percent of the black and 17% of the "other" students enrolled completed requirements. Forty-five percent completing were black and 55% were "other". Note: Forty-nine (49%) percent of the students enrolled in Special Studies during the Winter quarter were black.

SUBJECT: Special Studies Test Development

Background Information Regarding Test Development:

- A. Three testing sub-committees, one each in reading, mathematics and English, were authorized by the Special Studies Academic Advisory Committee during the Spring of 1975.
- B. These committees have been developing test instruments since October, 1975.
- C. Test items were written and administered experimentally during Spring Quarter 1976 and Winter Quarter 1977.
- D. Twenty-six institutions have participated in the experimental testing of test items.
- E. Faculty members and department heads from Special Studies and regular academic departments representing 12 junior colleges, 8 senior colleges and 2 universities have participated in the test development effort thus far.
- F. More than 3,000 students have participated in the pre-testing of experimental test items.
- G. The System minimum cutoff levels on the new tests will be equated to the current levels used on the CGP. Colleges will still be permitted to use higher requirements if they desire.

The following recommendations are offered by the Academic Advisory Committee on Special Studies:

I. Adoption of the newly developed <u>Reading test</u> with the following characteristics:

- A. Eight passages in length (40-48 test items),
- B. Seven passages to be scored for placement/exit purposes and one experimental passage to be used in developing additional forms of the test,
- C. Forty to 50 minutes administration time,
- D. Passages taken from freshman college textbooks,
- E. Covering these reading skills:
 - 1. Identification of Main Idea
 - 2. Derive Meaning from Vocabulary and Context Clues
 - 3. Recognition of Fact vs. Opinion
 - 4. Recognition of Implied Ideas
 - 5. Identification of Organizational Pattern
 - 6. Identification of Details
- F. Yielding single test score.
- II. Adoption of the newly developed <u>English</u> test with the following characteristics:
 - A. Sixty items in length,
 - B. Forty to 50 minutes administration time,
 - C. Items selected from pool of former "Regents' objective writing test" items,
 - D. Covering these English areas:
 - 1. Diction
 - 2. Sentence Structure
 - 3. Point of View
 - 4. Spelling
 - 5. Punctuation
 - 6. Usage
 - E. Yielding a single test score.
- III. Adoption of the newly developed Mathematics test with the following characteristics:
 - A. Consisting of arithmetic and algebra items,
 - B. Yielding 3 test scores (arithmetic, algebra, and composite),
 - C. Composite test consisting of 30 to 40 algebra and 30 to 40 arithmetic items,
 - D. Administration time depending on test length (approximately one hour),
 - E. Covering these mathematics topics:

Arithmetic

- 1. Place Value
- 2. Ordering & Inclusion
- 3. Whole Numbers
- 4. Fractions & Mixed Numbers
- 5. Decimals
- 6. Percentages
- 7. Conversions
- 8. Denominate Numbers
- 9. Ratio/Proportions
- 10. Averages
- 11. Graphs
- 12. Estimation

<u>Algebra</u>

- 1. Combining Terms
- 2. Translating Verbal/Algebraic
- 3. Solving Linear Equations
- 4. Substituting in Algebraic Expressions
- 5. Solving Literal Equations
- 6. Exponents & Roots
- 7. Algebraic Multiplication & Division
- 8. Systems of Linear Equations
- 9. Graphs of Linear Function
- 10. Linear Inequalities & Order

[Dr. Pounds, Dr. Rentz, and I further recommend that the two part scores (arithmetic and algebra) be used at the discretion of the institutions for advisement and placement in the Special Studies mathematics sequence and the composite score be required for exemption and exit from Special Studies mathematics.]

- IV. That the newly developed tests be available to institutions by June 21, 1977, for use in exit testing during Summer Quarter, 1977.
 - V. That the new tests be in full use by all institutions for placement purposes for Winter Quarter, 1978.
- VI. That the name of the newly developed test be: UNIVERSITY SYSTEM OF GEORGIA BASIC SKILLS EXAMINATION.

VII. Further recommended:

- A. That minimum SAT Scores of 326 in each area, verbal and mathematics, be established to exempt students from taking further placement testing (325 or less mathematics --- take mathematics placement test) (325 or less verbal --- take reading and English placement tests),
- B. That all institutions be required to develop standards of writing and evaluate writing skills using writing sample(s) as part of the requirements to exit from Special Studies English (Institutions may choose to use a locally developed instrument or the one prepared by the English Test Sub-Committee). Listed below are the criteria against which a writing sample would be evaluated if the System developed test were used:

The student must read three (3) short passages typical of freshman textbooks and write a 75-100 word (6-10 sentences) response to questions about the passages. Each response must have the following characteristics:

Charles Nash and I have had considerable discussion regarding the nature and description of the Special Studies Program at Floyd Junior College. I also understand that Dr. Nash has discussed the Program with you, Dean Walraven and Dr. Trimble.

Dr. Nash informs me that you, in keeping with Regents' Policy, have established a separate department; appointed a head, who answers to the chief academic officer; and created a separate budget for the department. It appears, however, that Floyd Junior College has failed to staff the department with a core of faculty in reading, mathematics and English. According to our records, only Richard W. Trimble and Lovie Borchardt, chairman and reading instructor, respectively, are part of the Special Studies Department.

Therefore, I am requesting that you submit to me your plans for the further development of a "core" faculty for your Special Studies Department. The principal objectives of such a "core" would be the responsibility, planning and implementation of remedial/developmental activities at Floyd Junior College.

I would appreciate having a report of your plans by May 20, 1977, with projected implementation not later than the beginning of fall quarter 1977.

If further explanation is needed regarding this request, please contact me.

SUBJECT: Special Studies Students' Success in Regular Coursework

Institutions were asked to provide data regarding the experiences of students in "regular college level coursework" after having participated in one or more of our Special Studies courses. They were asked to compare the grade point averages and percentages of A, B, C and D made by former Special Studies students and students who had been placed directly into regular coursework. The results of this study follow.

Table I -- Mathematics

This table shows that the grade point averages and grades of 2,379 former Special Studies and 9,062 "regular" students in college level mathematics were compared. The mean GPA's were 1.69 and 2.14 for former Special Studies and regular placement students, respectively. This represents just less than one-half letter grade difference. On the average, seventy-one (71%) percent of the former Special Studies passed the course(s) as compared to 79% of the regular placement students. The GPA range was .72 to 2.64 for former Special Studies students and 1.68 to 2.69 for regular placement students. The percentage passing range for Special Studies was 37% to 100%. The percentage passing range for regular placement was 26% to 95%.

Table II -- Social Science (Reading)

According to this table, 4,141 former Special Studies and 26,502 regular placement students were compared. The Special Studies students had all taken the Special Studies reading. The average GPA for Special Studies students was 1.73. The average for regular placement was 2.32. The difference in GPA is about one-half letter grade.

The median percentage passing for Special Studies was 83%, and 88% for regular placement. This is a difference of only 5%. The GPA range for Special Studies was 1.00 to 2.56 and 1.70 to 2.67 for regular placement. The percentages passing ranges were 63% to 100% for Special Studies, and 66% to 98% for regular placement.

Table III -- English

Three thousand, one hundred and fifty seven former Special Studies and 8,988 regular placement students were compared by GPA and grades in English. The average GPA for Special Studies was 1.55, and 2.04 for regular placement. This represents a difference of about one-half letter grade.

Seventy was the median percentage of former Special Studies students passing, and 81% was the median for regular placement. This is a difference of 11% points. The former Special Studies GPA range was 30% to 96%, and 61% to 96% for regular placement students.

At Columbus College, the GPA for all regular academic subjects for former Special Studies students was 1.76, and was 2.35 for regular placement students. At Southern Technical Institute, the GPA in Physics for former Special Studies Physics students was 1.71, and for regular placement students was 1.62. The percentages were 73% for Special Studies and 76% for regular placement.

Summary

Typically, in all three areas of mathematics, social science (reading) and English; former Special Studies students performed at about one-half letter grade below regular placement students. By observing the GPA's across the System, one sees that several schools are significantly below the System average. On the other hand, less difference between groups can be observed when grades are compared. The grade differences for students passing are 9 percentage points in mathematics, 5 points in reading (social science) and 11 points in English. It can also be observed that, in some instances, former Special Studies students performed better in regular college courses than did regular placement students.
