European Tours Planned

Two European tours are being planned by Floyd College personnel for next summer. Although the tours are available to students for college credit, faculty and staff members and their families are also invited to participate.

Jo Anne Starnes, professor of English, will lead a 16-day trip to London, Paris, Venice, Florence and Rome. Tentative dates for the tour are June 14-29. A non-refundable deposit of \$250 is due by November 13 and will be applied to the tour price of \$2,129.

Jim Cook, professor of history, will lead a nine-day trip titled "Alpine Splendor" July 28-August 5. The tour will include stops in Geneva, Switzerland, Munich and Vennia. The \$1,696 cost for the tour includes all transportation, rooms, taxes, breakfasts and suppers. A \$485 deposit may be paid now with the balance due by March 1.

Jo Anne and Jim will hold informational meetings about the tours Tuesday, October 29, at 12 noon in F-139, and at 6 p.m. in F-152.



Election Notes

Eighty Floyd College students were registered in the September 30-October 1 voter registration drive conducted on campus. This was the third voter registration drive held this year for a total of 137 new registrants.

The results of the straw vote which was held September 29 on campus were: Clinton, 48%, Bush, 33%, Perot, 17%, Marrou (Libertarian), 2%, and Fulani (New Alliance), 0%.

Enrollment at Record High

A total of 2,828 students are enrolled at Floyd College's three campuses this fall--an increase of more than 11% over last year.

The Rome campus has 2,424 students, the Etowah campus, 139 students and the Acworth campus at North Metro has 255 students.

Dr. Cundiff Confirmed As Floyd's Second President

Dr. Lynn Cundiff was confirmed as Floyd College's second president by the Board of Regents of the University System of Georgia at their October 14 meeting held in Americus. He will take office November 16.

Dr. Cundiff holds an Associate of Arts degree from Hannibal-LaGrange Junior College in Missouri, a Bachelor of Arts degree from William Jewell College in Missouri with emphasis in physical education and mathematics, a Master of Arts degree from Northeast Missouri State University with emphasis on educational administration, and a Doctor of Philosophy degree from Southern Illinois University with emphasis on educational leadership.

He has 26 years of teaching and administrative experience.
