

Enrollment for Summer Quarter at Floyd College is 1,496. There are 1,154 students on attending classes on the main campus, 245 at NMTI, and 170 at the Etowah campus. (Individual figures include duplicates.)

The National Youth Sports Program (NYSP) which is being held on campus for youths age 10-16 has enrolled 460 students and has an average daily attendance of 300. More than 26 staff members are working with the program which will continue through July.



Boyd, Melton Announce Retirements

After 25 years of service, Vice President for Student Affairs Harold Boyd, and Vice President for Finance Tom Melton have announced their retirements. Mr. Boyd will retire in March, 1997 and Mr. Melton, next summer.

On August 1 of this year, Mr. Boyd will step down as vice president and will assume the role of assistant to the President for Special Projects. The move will allow him to work on some time-intensive projects which he is interested in completing before his retirement.

Mr. Boyd and Mr. Melton both began working at the college before it opened in 1970. Their long and successful tenure at the college has seen the institution evolve from a small, junior college to a college with nearly 3,000 students on four campuses.

Police Academy Moves

After a twenty-year association, the Floyd College Police Academy will move to the Cave Spring campus of the Georgia School for the Deaf this week. The academy will no longer be associated with Floyd College.

The Floyd College Police Academy serves 12 counties in Northwest Georgia. It is one of 14 police academies in the state and is regulated by the Peace Officers Standards and Training Council (POST), a state agency. The academy was established in the Public Service Department of the college in July of 1975.

The decision to move the Academy was made at the state level. A partial reason behind the move was the lack of adequate space on the college's campus.

The Academy personnel and trainees have been a commanding presence on campus and will be missed.

Amelia Billingsly, associate professor of Language Arts, has been named interim director of the "Total Immersion Sign Language Interpreter" program. The program will receive a three-year, \$313,000, National Patterns of Academic Excellence grant from the Board of Regents. Ms. Billingsly will coordinate the search for a permanent director and head a steering committee which will set the academic guidelines for the program.
