## Foundation To Hold Annual Meeting

The Floyd College Foundation will hold its annual meeting Monday, February 12, at Heritage Hall's Centre Stage. The group will recognize major donors to the Foundation and elect new officers and board members.

Mary Louise Lever, chairman of the Foundation, will be nominated to serve again as chairman, according to President Lynn Cundiff. "Ms. Lever has served admirably as chairman of the Foundation for a number of years, and we are delighted that she is willing to remain with us through this transitional year as we establish an office of Advancement on campus to assist in the daily operations of fund-raising for the Foundation," said Dr. Cundiff.

The Foundation is expected to name eight new board members and renew six board memberships.

A report on the year's activities will include the successful Monte Carlo Gala fund-raiser which supported the development of Centre Stage as a performance arena.

#### Bremen Open House Scheduled

The college will hold an open house at its new center in Bremen Sunday, March 3, 2-4 p.m. The center is located on the second floor of the city hall building. *Jan King* is the administrator there. More than 70 students are currently taking classes in Bremen.

"We're very pleased with the enrollment at the Bremen Center this first quarter," said *Phil Kerr*, chairman, Division of Enrollment Management. "We believe that we can have up to 400 students from that area once we are located in a permanent building."

The college will offer classes in the City Hall building until next year when the center will move to the Waco Elementary School building which is being vacated due to the addition of a new school building.

Georgia Speaker of the House, Tom Murphy, and the Board of Regents of the University System of Georgia have been very supportive of a Floyd College campus in Haralson County.

Student Services Liaison at NMTI, has passed the National Certified Counselor exam, offered by the National Board of Certified Counselors.


