McCord Named VP

Pending Board of Regents approval next month, *Pat McCord* of Griffin, Georgia will assume the role of Vice President for Finance and Administration. He will officially be on board April 14, but will be on campus at times before that date.

Mr. McCord is currently Vice President for Business Affairs at Gordon College. He has previously served at Roanoke College in Virginia, Fort Valley State College, West Georgia College, and at the Board of Regents office as a University Budget Analyst.

A native of Georgia, Mr. McCord holds a Bachelor of Arts degree from West Georgia College, and a Master of Science in Administration form Georgia College in Milledgeville. He is married and has one daughter.

The Vice President's position became vacant in January when *Wesley Jones* returned to the position of Comptroller for personal reasons.

New Lighting Part of MMR Proposal

Each year the Board of Regents provides a pool of money to the colleges for major maintenance and repair (MMR) of current facilities. Last year the funds provided the repair of the lake's dam.


This year the college has proposed a number of needs for that money, including \$110,000 to replace and enhance the outside lighting on the central campus.

"The current campus lighting is old and inadequate," said Doug Webb, director of Plant Operations.

"It's age makes it impossible to repair, so we plan to replace the lighting in the parking lots, add walkway lighting, and add light leading up to the Astronomy Lab."

Other items on the list include \$80,000 to resurface the tennis courts; weather-proofing the outside of Heritage Hall; enhancing the heating and air systems in Walraven 200 and 202; and updating campus signage.

MMR funds will be allotted July 1, 1998.

low volume in the cafeteria, the college will discontinue assisted food service on the central campus in the evenings, and experiment with different ways to deliver food.

"The usage of the cafeteria is down, due in large part to the ongoing construction this year," said *President Lynn Cundiff*.

Plans are to purchase a coffee machine and to stock a sandwich machine with fresh sandwiches and fruit daily for evening students. In addition, the staff members in conjunction with Student Life are planning once-aweek theme lunches to be served outside.

"I think that we can come up with a solution that can be both economical and fun for the students and employees, that can help the cafeteria's business at the same time," said Penny Wills, Vice President for Student Development.

When the Student Center is reopened next Fall, the college will revisit at food service options.

The Georgia Leg- islature approved an average 6 percent raise for all employees of the University System of Georgia. The raise, however will not be effective until September 1, so that the system can fund the inclusion of accumulated sickleave pay for retirees.

In additional budget action, \$50,000 was included in the budget to start the planning phase of Floyd College's new Bartow Campus. Campus administrators hope that \$450,000 will be included in next year's budget for the project's architects, and that the \$17 million for construction will be budgeted the following year (fiscal 2001).
