

The Environmental Health and Safety Committee, headed by Michael Windelspecht, assistant professor of Biology, is concerned with policy issues, such as the designated smoking areas.

The Right-to-Know trainers, under the leadership of *Lynn Mills*, administrative secretary in Plant Operations, maintain accurate records of
