#### 365 To Graduate June 13

A record number of students will graduate from Floyd College this year during ceremonies scheduled for 10 a.m. Saturday, June 13, at the Forum in downtown Rome. The commencement address will be given by *Justice Robert Benham* of the Georgia Supreme Court.

The ceremony will include the presentation of two special awards: The President's Meritorious Award which will be presented to *Georgia Speaker of the House Tom Murphy*, and the Wesley C. Walraven Faculty Award which is not announced ahead of time.

**Regent Edgar Rhodes** will bring greetings from the Board of Regents, and **Bridgette Stewart**, HPER Lab Assistant will welcome the graduates into the Alumni Association.

This graduating class will include 15 students who will receive the Associate of Applied Science in Physical Therapist Assistant degree--the first graduates of this new program.

These will also be the last graduates to attend school under the Quarter calendar, since after 28 years the college (and the University System) will convert to the Semester system in the fall.

As in years past, the ceremony will be taped and broadcast over FCTV in the following weeks.

# NYSP Returns for 25th Year



Floyd College will be sponsoring its 25th annual summer camp June 15-July 24 as part of the National Youth Sports Program (NYSP).

The campus provides activities and guidance for economically disadvantaged children from Floyd, Gordon and Polk Counties. David Mathis, NYSP Project Administrator, is supervising the program.

The Floyd College program serves 350-400 youths ages 10-16 each year. The goal of the camp is to motivate the young people to learn self-respect through a program of sports instruction and competition.

Activities include supervised sports instruction in softball, soccer, volleyball and basketball, as well as classes in sailing and canoeing.

Enrichment classes will provide information on career and educational opportunities, study habits, drug and alcohol abuse and nutrition.

Academic and arts and crafts sessions will also be a part of the program.

Floyd's NYSP program is one of 173 held at colleges in 44 states. Last year, the Floyd program was awarded for being one of the top ten programs in the country.

Walker, Events Coordinator for Centre Stage.


"This is the first state-wide broadcast of this type from Floyd," said Walker. "I think it's a good opportunity for the college, and it will reflect positively on the Northwest Georgia community. It's important for us to put Rome on the map politically, to let them know we're here. The forum will help put us in the front tier of political exposure."

"I believe that the gubernatorial forum hosted by Floyd College and the Greater Rome Chamber of Commerce," said *Dr. Lynn Cundiff*, *Floyd College President*, "will help the candidates focus on this section of the state, our needs, and our strengths."

The Republicans will be taped from 7 p.m. until 8 p.m. and the Democrats from 8:15 p.m. until 9:15 p.m. Georgia Public TV will be broadcasting the forum on a tape delay basis. On Monday, June 8th, the Republican Party

There are currently five
Democratic candidates confirmed
to attend the forum: State Representative Roy Barnes of Marietta,
State Senator Steve Langford of
Atlanta, David Poythress of Atlanta, Morris James, Sr. of
Montezuma, Dr. Carlton H. Myers
of Pine Mountain, and Secretary of
State Lewis Massey.

Republican candidates who will attend are: *Michael Bowers* of Atlanta, *Nancy Schaefer* of Clarkesville, and *Bruce Hatfield* of Kennesaw. *Guy Milner* has declined.

Separate receptions for each party will be held before the taping of the show at the Heritage Hall building.

established the duel themes of Health Care and Education, which are dominant issues in this area.

"The GPTV crew is bringing a full remote setup," said Walker. "This is going to be produced like a live broadcast, though they're taping it to prevent any production glitches. No local media outlets will be allowed to carry the program live, but they will be able to get a feed to acquire sound bites."

Funding for the event is made possible by *Georgia Power*, *Bell South*, and *Redmond Regional Medical Center*.
