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## Graduation 2002

Two hundred and eight students graduated from Floyd College on May 11, including the college's first graduate with an associate's degree in Human Services, Gerontology Option.

During the ceremony, the Wesley C. Walraven Faculty Award for Meritorious Service was awarded posthumously to **Steve Burns**, professor of Social Work.

## Dental Hygiene Perfect Pass Rate Continues

For the 11th consecutive year, 100 percent of the students in Floyd College's Dental Hygiene program passed their National Board exams.

"To graduate from the dental hygiene program," said **Donna Miller**, director of Dental Hygiene, "students have to pass the National Board exam. They take the test during their second year of coursework. The exam consists of 300 multiple choice questions."

A student needs to score a 75 on the test to receive a passing grade. He or she will also have to pass a clinical board, during which the students clean a patient's teeth for a panel of dental care professionals.

"We've been around since 1990," said Miller, "but our first class to take the boards was in 1992, and they all passed. And we've had a 100 percent pass rate since."

The Dental Hygiene Program is a two-year program and accepts new students every fall.

## Walraven Nears Completion

After a year of work that was scheduled to last four months, the new pitched roof on the Walraven Building is near completion. The \$585,000 job used two years



of Floyd College's allotted Major Renovation and Repair funds from the Board of Regents. Renovation work has now begun on the interior of the building, with new carpet, wall coverings and ceiling tiles being installed in the hallways. Once the hallways are completed, work will begin on the office areas. **Doug Webb**, director of Physical Plant, expects the work to be completed in early fall.

## Foundations Hold Planning Retreat

The Floyd College Foundation and the Cartersville/Bartow College Foundation held a joint retreat on May 17. The session was facilitated by Association Of Governing Board of Universities and Colleges, with consultant Joe Phelan of New Hampshire.

"Floyd College is fortunate to have two community groups that provide a link to the diverse communities it serves," said **Judy Taylor**, Advancement Officer. "While the foundations represent two different geographic areas, their overall mission is the same – in general, to provide support for Floyd College."

"This joint board retreat provided the opportunity to explore the ways in which two community foundations can work together to support the mission of the institution as it expands to serve the northwest Georgia region."

The objectives of the retreat were to: reach consensus on mission; assess how successful foundation boards operate; determine actual strategies to address the mission relative to funding priorities; outline specific tasks relative to the determined strategies, and; agree on mechanism and accountability to accomplish tasks over a 12-14 month period.
