A committee of 12 Floyd College faculty members from across all disciplines will work on this project. **Dr. John Reiners**, associate professor of *Business and Economics*, will lead the committee.

"We're investigating the possibility of including Ethics as a component in as many courses as we can," stated Dr. Reiners.

Many colleges and universities have added ethics courses into their curriculum to better develop their graduates.

"There's a growing concern nationwide with ethics," says Dr. Reiners. "There is an increasing sense that ethical behavior is more important than making money."

Floyd College will also coordinate with other local institutions – Berry, Shorter and Coosa Valley Tech – to discuss their use of Ethics studies and how best to implement them into existing courses.
