



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## Mugleston Wins National Book Award

r. William Mugleston, chair of the division of Social and Cultural Studies at Floyd College, received the American Journalism Historians Association Award for the work Someone Had To Be Hated: Julian LaRose Harris – A Biography. Dr. Mugleston received the award during the American Journalism Historians Association 2003 annual convention that was held last month in Billings, Montana.



The Floyd College professor says he is surprised and honored by the award announcement. <u>Someone Had To Be Hated</u> began as Dr. Mugleston's doctoral dissertation while at the University of Georgia in the 1970s. During his professional career, he met Dr. Greg Lisby who also wrote his Master's thesis on the topic, leading to their collaboration on the book.

Someone Had To Be Hated centers around Julian LaRose Harris, a Georgia journalist. Both Harris and his wife, Julia Collier Harris, owned and served as editors of the Columbus Enquirer-Sun in Columbus, Georgia. They won the Pulitzer Prize in 1926 for their efforts to combat the Ku Klux Klan, lynching, prohibition and corruption in state government. Harris was also a supporter of state public education and of the University of Georgia.

## \$389,468 Grant Will Enhance Future Educators

he Educational Technology Training Center (ETTC) housed at Floyd College has received a grant from the United States Department of Education for training Education majors. This grant is one of 25 federal grants awarded nationally last month to institutions involved in training technology.

The grant, "Preparing Tomorrow's Teachers to Use Technology," amounts to \$389,468 over three years. The project will provide education majors training in utilizing technology in the classroom. The learning environment will use technology "to collect, synthesize, process, assemble and express information" to learn content standards and meet student achievement goals.

ETTC will be training students enrolled in the State University of West Georgia's satellite program in Dalton, Ga. The West Georgia program is based at Dalton State College.

This project is the first one of its kind for ETTC, which normally trains teachers already in the workforce.

Ms. Huffman made a presentation on the center's PROMOTE project, introducing the students who placed first in the project's competition. The students, led by Ms. McEntyre, spoke on what they learned from PRO-MOTE. School Superintendent Kathy Cox was on hand to present the students with their plaques and deliver the keynote address.

Donald Pardlow, instructor of English, successfully defended his doctoral dissertation in English Rhetoric and Applied Linguistics at Indiana University of Pennsylvania on July 14th, graduating on August 16th.

Sheila McCoy, professor of French/Spanish/English, published a poem, "Sandals," and an article, "La Mujer del Rio," in the Spring/Summer issue of The Journal of the Foreign Language Association of Georgia.
